"Tour of the YMCA's New Sports Center"

The Jerusalem International YMCA is thrilled to be opening the largest underground fitness center in the Middle East! The Sports Center will be designed and operated as a sports mall, hosting sports clubs and teams, schools, and sporting events from all over the city and beyond. Swim and basketball teams, dance groups and many other organizations will lease space in the YMCA sports mall. The current YMCA Health and Wellness Center will be transferred to the new facility and will have full use of five of the ten swimming lanes, the two story fitness room, and two of the six exercise studios. Members will receive the same access to swimming, group exercise classes, showers, saunas, etc. with no changes in membership fees.

The new center will offer more space and all new, state-of-the-art exercise equipment and facilities.

- 93,635 square feet spread over three levels
- Indoor 10-lane swimming pool
- Large Health and Wellness Center
- Gymnasium
- Three squash courts that can be transformed to a large multi-purpose room
- Six group exercise rooms
- Martial arts studio
- Crèche (child care)
- Juice bar
- Spa with six treatment rooms
- Three separate lobbies for social gatherings
- Sport shop selling swim suits, sports clothes and
- accessories
- Men's and women's locker rooms
- Rooftop plaza (designed to help cool the building as well as provide a gathering space)

Woman's day last week made me think about "WOMEN IN ROTARY"

Rotary just had its 112th birthday, but from its charter in 1905 until 1989 it was - "MEN ONLY."

In 1989 the first women were accepted in Rotary including one in our club.

Today, in 2017, which is only 28 years later there are 242,560 women Rotarians in the world which equates to 21 % of Rotarians worldwide.

82.75% of clubs worldwide (about 32 000 clubs) have female members. Our club has 8 women members (26%)

Of these clubs, 7857 have women as presidents (23%) this year. In our district, 20 clubs (about 35%) have women presidents)

There are 96 (19 %) women District Governors in Rotary's (about) 520 districts.

In the Rotary year 2003-04 there were 13 women District Governors including myself (about 2,5 %)

There are now Women RI Board Directors, RI Foundation Trustees and women members in all RI Committees.

I believe it will not be long when we shall have the first woman as the Rotary International President.

Where would Rotary be

today without us!

Celebrating the Beauty that Learns to Fight the Beast:

A Roadmap for Women on International Women's Day

If you are a woman reading this article stop and pat yourself on the back for the long way you and your fellow sisters have walked. You probably have an education, a job, you are free to choose your partner, dress as you like, live where you want. You probably can manage to live on your income, without your partner's support. And these are all things you should be proud you have achieved and celebrate for.

But parallel to this reality you have most probably been a victim of sexual harassment, belittlement and one in four has experienced an attempted rape. And unfortunately you may even be dead, buried in the ground due to your partner's violence and brutal taking of your life. And you my dear sister, do not have a voice anymore, it is already too late to recount the days of your horror and fear. You felt vulnerable, you felt unprotected, you may have reported your suspicions to the police but hey, nobody really took you seriously and it pains me to say this to you: the violent taking of your life has been diminished to a sad statistic.

Twenty is the average number of women killed in Israel over the last years due to domestic violence. I search on the internet and find these quotes: "An estimated one in 5 women will be a victim of sexual violence globally." And "every one in three Israeli women falls victim of sexual assault." Moreover, "Violence against single women rises nearly twenty-fold since 2003." And sadly "welfare officials estimate that only one percent of the 200,000 men who engage in domestic abuse attend violence prevention centers." This is all very bad news.

I was thinking of these statistics as I was walking away from a book reading presentation of Moshe Menasheof's recent book on Dreams and Memory that took place at the Holzer bookstore on Jaffa Road in Jerusalem last night. Upon walking back to take the bus home, I encountered groups of teenage boys and felt conscious of my being a woman on my own at 11pm at night, walking down Jaffa Street surrounded by groups of men. It felt uneasy.

But having practiced self-defense for a year and being a graduate of the Impact course in self-defense, I felt confident in my ability to stand up for myself and protect my body should there had been a need. Suppose somebody had grabbed me on the shoulder, I would have turned around, checked as to his intentions and if judged to be of harassing nature, he would have received an elbow right in his face. And my abilities gave me confidence, as I was walking by myself from Jaffa to King George Street.

And that brings me to the basis in my mind of women's empowerment. As long as we women rely on men: our dads, brothers, partners to defend our physical bodies we are not free people. We will only feel free and equal when we reclaim our right to our self-defense, and master the skills that defending our bodies requires. In nature, female and male animals alike know how to defend themselves and protect their young. They are expected to do it whether male or female. It is only in us humans that women have been asked to give up on our basic right of self-defense, and rely on the men to take care of us.

The self-defense awareness which is very basic yet still not widespread and internalized by all came to me gradually through being exposed to my daughters' judo classes at a self-defense school for girls in Jerusalem. There, when waiting to pick them up, I was exposed to films showing women in my age and older, fighting to defend their bodies from attackers. I read Ellen Snortland's book Beauty Bites Beast and saw the film Ellen made telling the story of women learning self-defense around the world and the impact that had on their lives.

In my mind, learning self-defense is as basic as learning to brush one's teeth. Both are lessons that learning them will serve your body and safeguard your well-being for the rest of your life.

So dear girl and woman and dear man, father of a girl, brother of a woman, look into the matter of self-defense for you and your daughters, sisters, and mothers. Go out to your schools, community centers, synagogues, churches and mosques and organize a course for you and your friends. Let us all reclaim our basic right for self-protection and defense. We owe it to ourselves; we owe it to our bodies. Let us master the skills to protect ourselves by ourselves as women. That mastery will move us all a few steps ahead towards dignity, equality and self-respect that we all deserve, whether born in a man's or woman's body.

Today, 2073 years ago, Brutus killed the Roman Dictator Gaius Julius Caesar on the Ides of March (= 15th of March).

Julius Caesar was born on 13 July 100 BCA. He became famous as a politician, general and also as an author.

Millions of Europeans students made their first knowledge of Latin, reading his "Commentari De Bello Gallico" ("The Gallic Wars").

Caesar played a critical role in the events that led to the rise of the Roman Empire. Till today, Caesar is an important theme for literature, theater and

film. In 1599 Shakespeare wrote his famous theater play and he wrote Caesar's famous last words said to his murderer while dying: "Et tu, Brute" ("And you, Brutus?", i.e. "You too, Brutus?").

Cleopatra, Queen of Egypt some years before, in Egypt, was Caesar's mistress and mother of their son, Caesarion. The affair between the beautiful Cleopatra and Caesar is till today a topic for literature and film.

General Caesar, by his victories during the Gallic Wars, completed 51 BCA, extended Rome's territory to Britain and the Rhine. He built a bridge over the Rhine. He crossed the English Channel. The Senate called him back to Rome in 49 BC, he refused and instead entered Italy with his 13th Legion, crossing the Rubicon, the river in the North of Italy, which marked the frontier with Gallia Cisalpina. When Rome called him back, the army was already crossing the river, an act of insurrection and Julius Caesar may have uttered the famous phrase "alea iacta est"—the die is cast. Till today the phrase "crossing the Rubicon" — means to arrive at a point of no return. Caesars victory in the civil war that followed, gave him great power. Upon returning back to Rome, he became one of the three Consuls.

Julius Caesar formulated a policy of allowing Jews to follow their traditional religious practices, a policy which was followed, and extended, by Augustus, first emperor of Rome. This gave Judaism the status of a "religio licita" (permitted religion) throughout the Empire.

The assassination of Julius Caesar, was the result of a conspiracy by many Roman senators, led by Longinus and Brutus. They stabbed Caesar to death in a location adjacent to the Theatre of Pompeius on the Ides of March (March 15th), 44 BC.

Caesar was the dictator of the Roman Republic at the time, having recently been declared "dictator perpetua" (for lifetime) by the Senate. This declaration made several senators fear that Caesar wanted to overthrow the

Senate in favour of tyranny

The place where Caesar was assassinated is close to the Church of San Andrea Della Valle.

Last year the Club donated a car to the Malteser, for their work on the Isle of Lampedusa. The Club made a trip to the Isle to attend personally the gift.







