International Toast

So as not to have our weekly International Toast bogged down in too many dates of monumental historical significance, this week's International Toast goes to Chester, England. Not that Chester England does not have many historical reasons for celebration and/or noteworthy accomplishments, but one, in particular, has gone unnoticed and unremembered for far too long.

On this date, 17 February 1795, horticulturalist extraordinaire, from Chester, England, Thomas Seddal reported having harvested a potato of no mean dimension; history recording its size as 8.3 kgs. Mind boggling as this tu-



berous agricultural feat is no records have survived (at least on the internet) as to the disposition of the oversized spud but for compari-

son's sake note the picture of Nigel Kermonde's currently reigning world's largest potato, weighing in at a paltry 7 lbs. 13 oz. (3.55 kg's). It is an obvious pity that Mr. Seddal's skills were not available to the Irish in later years from 1845-52.



entry was Queens Low-





From: D A MacArthur and C H Nimitz


Wilco Sir, but both Chester and I are some what confused, exactly what does the term politically correct mean?
