Micha Feldmann, Head Ethiopian Outreach Project SELAH – Israel Crisis Outreach Centre:

"Responding to Crisis in the Ethiopian Community"

Micha Feldmann was born in the Land of Israel (British Mandate Palestine) in 1944. Since 1970 he has worked on immigration and absorption, and since 1982 has devoted his life to bringing the Ethiopian Jews to Israel, and help them in their absorption into Israeli society.



In the 1980s, Micha was the head of the Jewish Agency Mission to Ethiopia and the Israeli Consul there. He took part in "Operation Salomon" that in 1991 succeeded in bringing out of besieged Addis Ababa in one weekend 14,310 Ethiopian Jews.

Micha speaks Amharic fluently and knows virtually every Ethiopian family in Israel. He is therefore known as "Abba Micha".

Currently, Micha serves as the Director of the Ethiopian Department within SELAH - the Israel Crisis Management Center (ICMC) an organization that helps take care of new immigrants from Ethiopia and the FSU, who have been stricken by tragedy.

Since its founding in 1993, SELAH has given care, support, and hope to more than 25,000 immigrants coping with tragedy and disaster. SELAH's emergency teams – trauma experts as well as trained volunteers –respond to disaster in real time. Faced with the

challenge of providing for the special needs of immigrants coping with trauma, SELAH has developed a variety of culture-sensitive programs that bring

together immigrants struggling with traumatic loss and provide opportunities for sharing pain and mobilizing resources.

To Be or Not to Be?

Should we Establish an Amuta?

Dear members,

As you probably read in last week's Bulletin*, some quite strong protests and warnings arose at the moment we started to implement the decision of the Board, taken in February this year, to make the club into an Amuta, i.e. give it proper legal status.

There were two reasons for this decision. The first, direct one was that we could not deposit the RI Global Grant for the Dan's Peace Education project in the club's bank account. This because, while the account is titled "Jerusalem"

Rotary Club" it legally belongs to the individual assigned by the club to be the signatories. For legal reasons our bank could not accept the deposit, and we had to return the grant to TRF. Through the good offices of Irène Lewitt, the



Lod Rotary Club, which is an amuta, agreed to accept the deposit and disburse it for us, as necessary for our project.

The second reason is the practical effect of the club's bank account technically belonging to three individuals. Changing the individuals each year when the club officers change, is a complicated matter. The effect is that our officers now

cannot deal with the club's affairs by themselves. This is legally and technically far from an ideal situation.

The objections to turning the club into an amuta, you could read extensively in last week's Bulletin. The objections are correct and strong arguments against the change. So what do we do? The decision 2016-17 Board remains in effect, but is implementing it wise? The classical solution is, of course, to institute a committee for further study. And this is what the Board did also now.

The committee will, hopefully sometime after the Yamim Noraim, present to the club Assembly the arguments for and against the establishment of the Amuta, and possibly if there are other alternatives. The arguments have to be as substantiated as possible and then the Assembly has to decide how to proceed.

The members of the committee have not yet all agree to serve. As soon as the composition is complete and the terms of its work are finally defined, we will keep you updated. In the meantime, all your thoughts, worries and expectations are welcome with me or the other Board members.
