
Colonel Brian T. Lamson, Director of Security Sector Governance, US General Consulate, Jerusalem:

"Security Coordination in the West Bank"

Colonel Brian T. Lamson became Director of Security Sector Governance in the Office of the Security Coordinator, US Consulate in Jerusalem in June of 2014. He is responsible for US programs and assessments in support of Palestinian Security Force development and synchronization of US efforts with international partners. Prior to this, he served at the College of International Security Affairs of the National Defense University teaching courses on counterterrorism, strategy, and Middle Fast and South

counterterrorism, strategy, and Middle East and South Asia security.

His other assignments have included senior army strategist at the Office of the Secretary of Defense, chief strategist for police development at NATO Training Mission – Afghanistan, and military advisor to Ambassador Richard Holbrooke, Special Representative for Afghanistan and Pakistan. Colonel Lamson was



He was US representative to the Defense Services Command and Staff College in Mirpur, Bangladesh, and the Army Attaché at the US Embassy in Kabul, Afghanistan. He has also worked as a strategist in the Office of the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on the Chairman's New Administration Transition Team where he led efforts to bridge the military strategy for Afghanistan between Presidential Administrations.

Colonel Lamson holds a BA Degree with distinction in History from Iowa State University, a Master of Defense Studies from the National University of Bangladesh, and a Master of Arts in International Relations with a certificate in South Asia Studies from the Jackson School of International Studies of the University of Washington in Seattle. He speaks Bengali and Urdu and has been a fellow with the U.S. State Department, Department of Energy, the Institute for World Politics, and MIT.

International Toast

Lindigo, Sweden

This Wednesday, April 15, Nissan 26 is the eve of the The Holocaust and Heroism Day that commemorates the millions of women, men, adolescents, children and babies, that were murdered by the Nazis during WW II. They were from different countries and religions, but the majority were mainly Jews - six million of them. We honour their memory with respect. On this day we also remember the Gentiles, non-Jews, both



women and men, who risked their lives saving Jews. These brave indivisuals are commemorated at Yad Vashem as "Righteous Among the Nations."

From these Righteous heroes we honour today the memory of Raoul Wallenberg, a Swedish architect, businessman and diplomat, who served as Sweden's special envoy

in Budapest between July and December 1944. He saved tens of thousands of Jews in Nazioccupied Hungary during the Holocaust from the Nazis and their Hungarian Fascist collaborators during the later stages of the war.

On January 17, 1945, during the Siege of Budapest by the Red Army, Wallenberg was detained by the Soviet authorities on suspicion of espionage and he subsequently disappeared. Later it was reported that he died on 17 July 1947, aged 35, while imprisoned by the KGB secret police of the communist authorities in the notorious Lubyanka prison that also served as the KGB headquarters in Moscow.

The State of Israel granted Wallenberg honorary citizenship in 1986 and honored him at Yad Vashem as one of the "Righteous Among the Na-

tions." He is also an honorary citizen of the USA, Canada, Hungary and Australia. In Israel, five streets have been named after him.

Raoul Gustaf Wallenberg was born on 4 August 1912 in the summer



house of his grandparents on the island of Lidingo in the Stockholm Archipelago. The **Rotary Club** of Lidingo was chartered in 1954. They meet on Fridays at noon at the Hotel Foresta in Lindigo.

Our Projects

'Service Above Self' is a basic tenet of Rotary and a desire to serve is a fundamental reason for joining Rotary.

The Jerusalem Rotary Club has always taken this to heart and from its inception, its Community Service Committee has been actively involved in serving our community.

Early in its history the club supported projects for handicapped children and orphans, obtained a container load of medical equipment for Yad Sarah, sponsored a night school for "street boys" and initiated the idea of a fire brigade for Jerusalem. The City Administration took over the latter while the cause of handicapped children became one of the chief activities of the committee. The Hospital for Crippled Children (now Alyn Hospital) turned into the chief beneficiary of the club.

Nothing has changed since those early days. The Community Service Committee continues to search out, respond to and develop needed communal projects in Jerusalem and to participate in or to initiate larger international projects, as well as smaller grants to initiatives like the Jerusalem Rape Crisis Centre and to Shalom Kitah Alef. A complete list of these projects would be too long for this review, but to mention some from the last decade will provide an idea of their breadth and scope:

- * Handrails for the Gerard Behar Center and Jerusalem Theater;
- An open-to-thepublic forum on the subject of Living Wills;
- A playground for a park in Musrara on the Jerusalem 'seam';



- Bicycles for schoolgirls in a tsunamidevastated village in India;
- Panoramic X-Ray equipment for the Trudi
 Birger Dental Clinic;

- Help to develop a computer mouse for the blind and hours devoted to training blind individuals in its use:
- Videoconferencing equipment for Herzog Hospital;



Currently our club is monitoring an Annemasse -Geneve RC sponsored Global Grant to provide life-saving surgery for ten Palestinian children, and to train Palestinian nurses in intensive-care techniques and genetic counselling. We are participating in a District-wide water education Global Grant project and assisting a new Jerusalem NGO to provide supervised after school activities that are not provided elsewhere for special needs children. We are offering financial support for an Indian mobile early detection of breast cancer Global Grant project that is awaiting RI approval.

Community needs abound. There is never a shortage of those in need. How to best use our skills, knowledge and resources requires decisions from the Community Services Committee

and the club. If we are not to coast on our laurels, we must be open to exploring all areas of need that are brought to our attention, how to



make ourselves better known as a source of help, answer the questions, "Do our criteria for taking on a project need revision?" and "What project do we choose that will maximize the use of our of finance and manpower resources?"

Providing service is a never-ending, ever changing challenge. Are we open to fresh ideas and are we sufficiently flexible and involved? If so, then we are maintaining an 84 year old tradition of our club but if not, then we must be open to improvement and change.

In Memoriam

Haltern am See, Germany

April 1st is traditionally the time for practical jokes and silly International Toasts. On this occasion events, *force majeur*, has taken over and we need to reflect on the fragility of life. The media reports told us:

Germanwings Flight 9525 was a scheduled international passenger flight from Barcelona–El Prat Airport in Spain to Düsseldorf Airport in Germany, operated by Germanwings, a low-cost airline owned by Lufthansa. On 24 March 2015, (last week,) the aircraft, an Airbus A320-200, crashed 100 km northwest of Nice, in the French Alps, after a constant descent that

began one minute after the last routine contact with air traffic control and shortly after the aircraft



had reached its assigned cruise altitude. All 144 passengers and six crew members were killed.

French and German pros-

ecutors, and a spokesman for Germanwings, all believe that the crash was intentionally caused by the co-pilot, 27-year-old Andreas Lubitz.

Lubitz, who is believed to have locked the captain out of the cockpit, had obtained a sick note from his doctor for the day of the crash but reported for duty nonetheless.

In response to the incident and the circumstances of Lubitz's involvement, aviation authorities in Canada, New Zealand and Germany implemented new regulations that require two authorized personnel to be present in the cockpit at all times. Three days after the incident the European Aviation Safety Agency issued a temporary recommendation for airlines to ensure that at least two crew members, including at least one pilot, are in the cockpit at all times

of the flight.

Another dreadful news story that within it had additional elements of horror. On the flight there was a school party of 16 teenagers and two teachers from the Joseph Koening Gymnasium from the small resort town of Haltern am See that has a population of 38,000. That is the same size as Kiryat Motzkin or Rosh Ha'ayin. Needless to say the families and school are in shock and as in all small towns the teenagers and their families are known to many. Given its experience Zaka, the experienced emergency organi-

zation that deals with the aftermath of terrorist attacks in Israel, has been called in to retrieve and identify body parts.
