This Week's Program



His Excellency Mr. Gilles Arnout Beschoor Plug
Ambassador
Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands
“Dutch-Israeli Relations in a Changing World”



His Excellency Gilles Arnout Beschoor Plug, Ambassador to Israel from the Kingdom of the Netherlands, was born in 1962. He completed a Masters of Law from Erasmus University, Rotterdam, in 1987. He then joined the Foreign Ministry in 1988 with initial service in Moscow, Nairobi and at headquarters in The Hague.

From 1997 to 2000, Ambassador Beschoor Plug served as Private Secretary to HM The Queen and HRH Prince Claus of the Netherlands. He then was assigned to the Management Team of the European Integration Department. Overseas assignments followed as Deputy Ambassador in Syria (2003-07, and then as Ambassador in Abu Dhabi (2007-10). Back in The Hague, Ambassador Beschoor Plug was appointed Director for North Africa and the Middle East (2010-14). For the year thereafter, he served as Temporary Chargé d’Affaires, serving successively as interim Head of the Representative Office of the Netherlands in Ramallah (Palestinian Territories), Head of Eastern Europe Policy Unit at the Europe Department and finally as Coordinator for follow-up on the Malaysian Air plane crash in Ukraine in which 196 out of the 296 killed were Dutch citizens.

Ambassador Beschoor Plug is married to Louise Martine Wesseling..

In 2015, he took up his duties in Tel Aviv as Ambassador to Israel.

Today we remember the Israeli astronaut Ilan Ramon born on June 20th 1954 in Ramat Gan. His parents were Holocaust survivors. Ilan was an Israeli fighter pilot and later the first Israeli astronaut for NASA.

Ilan Ramon was the space shuttle payload specialist of STS-107, the fatal mission of Columbia Space Shuttle, in which he and six other crew members were killed in a re-entry accident. At the age of 48, he was the oldest member of the crew.

Ilan studied electronics and computer engineering at the Tel Aviv University upon finishing his studies, he joined the Israeli Air Force.

After his graduation as a fighter pilot in 1974 he was sent to „Mirage and F16“ training in Israel and Utah, USA.



In 1981 he was the youngest pilot taking part in Operation Opera, Israel's strike against Iraq's unfinished Osiraq nuclear reactor.

In 1997, Ramon was selected to train for a space shuttle mission with a payload that included a multispectral camera for recording desert aerosol (dust).

From 1998 until 2003 he trained at the Johnson Space Center, Houston, Texas.

STS-107 Columbia

(January 16 – February 1, 2003).

The 16-day flight was a dedicated science and research mission and the crew successfully conducted approximately 80 experiments. Although considered a secular Jew, Ramon followed Jewish observances while in orbit. **"I feel I am representing all Jews and all Israelis."** He sought advice from a Chabad Lubavitch rabbi, Zvi Konikov, about how to observe the Jewish Sabbath in space, as the period between sunrises in orbit is approximately 90 minutes.



The STS-107 mission ended abruptly when The Space Shuttle Columbia was destroyed and its crew perished during re-entry, 16 minutes before the scheduled landing.

Ramon carried with him a pencil sketch, "Moon Landscape", drawn by 16-year-old Petr Ginz, who died in Auschwitz (from Yad Vashem). Ramon also took with him a microfiche copy of the Torah given to him by Israeli president Moshe Katsav and a miniature Torah scroll.

37 pages from the diary he was keeping while in orbit survived the crash and the pieces of paper were restored in the Israel Museum.



Ramon wrote on the last day of the journal: **"Today was the first day that I felt that I am truly living in space. I have become a man who lives and works in space."**

The Rotary Club of Houston was founded in August of 1912 by newspaper executive Robert Cornell and met at the brand new Rice Hotel for seventy three years.

The club's membership grew steadily until September, 1963, when it became the world's largest with 773 members.

The first service project of The Rotary Club of Houston began in 1919 when it first supported the Young Residents of the Burnett Bayland County Home with Christmas parties and summer picnics-support' that today involve

workshops, preparing the youth for entering the workforce successfully.

The four major projects today are:

1. The Rotary Lombardi Award: presented annually to the Outstanding College Lineman of the Year. This is a fund-raising event benefiting cancer research. In late 1970, five weeks after NFL Coach Vince Lombardi died of cancer, the first Rotary Lombardi Award dinner was held to recognize the outstanding college football lineman -- who best exemplifies the discipline of Vince Lombardi. The legendary coach of the Green Bay Packers first made a name for himself as member of Fordham University's "Seven Blocks of Granite," renowned in the thirties for being the most unyielding line in college football. The trophy is a 40 -pound block of granite atop a silver pedestal..

2. Rotary Distinguished Citizen Award is presented annually to someone in Houston who exhibits high ideals, leadership and philanthropy. The funds raised support the club's on-going service activities.

3. Camp Enterprise is an annual activity of a three days camp, that introduces business and business ethics to 75 high school juniors from the Houston area, **the best of the best.** Funds for this event are raised with an annual golf tournament. **4. 1993** the club realised the 26 million \$ Jesse H. Jonas Rotary House, to house Rotarians from all over the world, that are to be treated for cancer in **Texas Medical Center.** The realisation was made possible by RC Houston and the Houston Endowment Fund. It is the largest rotary Project realised in the world of Rotary International!



Can you find the 20 things that are different in these two pictures?






