R/Tony Kolankewicz USFSO (ret)

" A Light-hearted Look at U.S. Presidents And Secretaries of State"



Have you ever wondered what it's like to meet senior American officials up close and personal? How do you break through the phalanx of security personnel? And how do these senior officials break out of their cocooned existence?

Tony Kolankiewicz has had the opportunity to meet a number of presidents and secretaries of state, as well as senior members of Congress, dur-

ing his career as a Foreign Service political officer with the Department of State. Like most Foreign Service personnel, he spent the bulk of his career overseas, serving at three diplomatic posts in Asia and four in Europe. Prior to joining the Foreign Service, he also spent 10 years on active duty as an Army intelligence officer, serving one overseas tour in the Middle East and two in Asia. He retired from the Foreign Service in 2010 and now follows his wife, Carmen, in her own Foreign Service career, joining her for one posting in Africa and, currently, in Jerusalem.

Tony was born and raised in Philadelphia. He has undergraduate degrees from the University of Maryland in International Relations and Business Management and a graduate degree from Columbia University in International Affairs. He has two daughters from a previous marriage. Tony enjoys traveling, hiking, reading, and genealogical research.

His conclusion about senior US officials? In spite of the unapproachable aura that often surrounds them, most of the time they're just like the rest of us.

Philip Cortelyou Johnson

(July 8, 1906 - January 25, 2005) was an American architect, best known for his works of Modern architecture, including the Glass House in New Canaan, Connecticut, and his works of postmodern architecture,



particularly 550 Madison Avenue (Formerly the ATT&T Building and then the Sony Building), designed with John Burgee.

In 1978 he was awarded an American Institute of Architects Gold Medal and in 1979 the first Pritzker Architecture Prize.

Philip Johnson was responsible for some of the landmark buildings in New York, but he created also some icons of architecture outside the city. He was known both for his promotion of the International Style and, later as a postmodernist architect.

Johnson graduated in 1930 in philosophy at Harvard University. In 1932 he was named director of the Department of Architecture of the Museum of Modern Art in New York. In 1940 Johnson returned to Harvard, where he studied architecture with Marcel Breuer. His real mentor however was Ludwig Mies von der Rohe, with whom he worked on the widely praised

Johnson became famous for the design of his own residence, known as The Glass House, in New Canaan, Connecticut (1949). The house, which is notable for its severely simple rectilinear structure and its use of large glass panels as walls, owed much to the precise, minimalist language of Mies von der Rohe. After Philip Johnson's death, his house was opened to the public.

After completing the Glass House, he completed two more houses in New Canaan in a style similar to that of Mies; the Hodgson House (1951) and the Wiley House (1953). In 1953 he also created an architectural sculpture garden for the Museum of Modern Art in New York.

Philip Johnson was very controversial because of his sympathy for nationalist and anti-Semitic ideas during the Thirties. Later, he made

his excuses for his opinions. In the mid-1950s, Philip Johnson designed a Synagogue for Kneses Tifereth Israel Congregation. located in suburban Port Chester, NY. It is a classic example of a 1950's Synagogue design that reflects the growth in

American Jewish life in the

post-war era when more than 500 synagogues were built throughout the United States.

Johnson undertook the commission for no fee, as a public atonement to the Jewish people for his pro-fascist activities in the



In Israel Philip Johnson is responsible, together with Israeli architect Gideon Ziv, for the

Sorek Nuclear Centre an impressive brutal concrete building,

near Palmachim, 12 km to the south of Tel Aviv.



Philip Johnson lived and died in New Canaan, Conn., a wealthy city to the northeast of New York, with many important homes, built by leading architects.

New Canaan has today about 20.000 inhabitants, many of them

working in NYC.

Turkey Ossobuco



I made this last week. It was so delicious, that I have decided to share my recipe with you.

Rub the pieces with lemon and put them aside!

The ingredients: for 6 pieces, meaning 3 turkey legs. There are actually 8 pieces, but I took 2 + the end of the legs to make a soup

- 3 tablespoons of olive oil
- 1 cup flour
- 1 big onion finely sliced

1 cup of dry wine (200 grams)

1 cup of the soup which you prepared from the turkey legs. Salt and pepper to taste.

Mix the flour with a little salt and pepper.

1. Cover each piece of turkey ossobuco with the flour. Heat the oil in a large casserole and lay each piece of turkey carefully. Brown them on all sides.

Once browned take them out and reserve them on a plate.

2. Add to the hot oil the slices of onion. When the onions are soft,

- 3. Add the leek, when that is soft add the 2 chopped garlic cloves. Mix
- **4.** Add the sliced carrots. At that point, you can add 1/2 a cup of the soup.
- 5. Add the chopped tomato and mix a little.
- **6.** Add the other 1/2 cup of soup and the cup of wine.
- <u>7.</u> Cover and let all this simmer for about 10-15 minutes. Then add the pieces of turkey. With a spoon put some of the sauce with the vegetables on top of each piece of turkey.

Lower the heat, and let it simmer for at least an hour. The more the better. Checking once in a while, and basting (putting sauce and vegetables on the pieces of turkey.)

Taste, and if necessary add salt and pepper.

You can either make a rice, pasta, or a purée to accompany the dish!


