



A Media Report From Rotary International

Dear Colleagues:

As part of our continued efforts to increase our public outreach and measure results, I am pleased to report that Rotary received widespread media coverage throughout 2015, with more than 500 articles in 20 countries – representing a 33 percent increase in coverage from 2014. Roughly 75 stories appeared in top tier international news organizations, including eight out of the 10 most influential ranked by Forbes, such as the Associated Press, Agence France Presse, BBC, CNN, Reuters, The New York Times, The

Washington Post and Wall Street Journal.

Highlights include coverage of the one-year polio-free milestone in Nigeria and Africa:

Rotary's social media presence was strong in 2015. Rotary and End Polio Now Facebook and Twitter channels gained more than 125,000 fans and followers. Overall, there was 46 percent increase in reach across all Rotary's social channels from 2014 to 2015.

International Toast

Rotary Club of Dublin, Ireland

This week we toast the Rotary Club of Dublin, Ireland, where on 13 April, 110 years ago, Samuel Beckett was born.

Though he studied at Trinity College, Dublin, and played professional cricket for a

time, he worked most of his life in Paris where he associated with the likes of James Joyce, Alberto Giacometti, Marcel Duchamp, and Peggy Guggenheim.

His first books were published in the 1930s, collections of poems and critical essays on literature, which found inspiration in the writings of Proust, Descartes, Schopenhauer, Goethe, and Joyce.

Beckett wrote his most famous play "Waiting for Godot", in French because he found it easier to write in that language "without style", something he felt the play required. It has played continuously since it was writ-

ten with international success. Other well known of his works include "Happy End", "Endgame", and "I can't go on, I'll go on".

Becket died on December 22 1989.



Dublin was the first Rotary club to be formed outside of North America in 1911. The club belongs to District 1160. The President 2015/2016 is Donald Gor-

don. The meetings are at the Grand Canal Hotel close to the southern docks on Mondays at 12:45pm.

In addition to the Rotary Club of Dublin's active participation in the ef-

forts to eradicate Polio in Africa, the club also assists with the Zamda Educational Project which supports a

hospital and school for homeless and destitute children (many of whom are HIVinfected) in Zamda in Zambia:

The Club raises funds for its Foundation and Club projects with the Annual Duck Race, Toy Ducks are sold for €20 each or 3 for €50 and released into the river, the first ones to arrive at the finish (if they arrive) receive prizes.

Thanks very much for the Weekly Bulletin which I will send to my children and grandchildren. I will also look into your archive.


