
Zomer immigrated to Israel in 2010 to become Noble Energy's Director of Corporate Affairs in Israel.

Éric Alfred Leslie Satie (17 May 1866 – 1 July 1925), who signed his name Erik Satie after 1884, was born in Honfleur. He grew up with

his grandparents, after his Mother died when he was five years old. His father worked at that time in Paris and he sent his son to the Conservatorium in Paris.




Satie was a colorful figure in the early 20th-century Parisian avant-garde. His work was a precursor to later artistic movements such as Minimalism, Surrealism, Repetitive Music, and the Theatre of the Absurd.

An eccentric, Satie was introduced as a "gymnopedist" in 1887, shortly before writing his most famous compositions, the Gymnopédies. Later, he also referred to himself as a "phonometrician" (meaning "someone who measures sounds"), preferring this designation to that of "musician". In addition to his body of music, Satie was "a thinker with a gift of eloquence" who left a remarkable set of writings. Although in later life he prided himself on publishing his work under his own name, in the late 19th century he appears to have used pseudonyms such as Virginie Lebeau and François de Paule.



His first love was the painter Suzanne Valadon, who painted a wonderful portrait of him. Satie is the father of Minimalism and Cubism in music. He composed the provoking "Music for Airport Furniture". In 1916 he met Jean Cocteau and created together with him



the Ballet "Parade" with a scenery painting by Pablo Picasso and performed by the Ballets Russes of Sergej Diaghilew.



Erik Satie died very young, in 1925, at the age of only 59, due to his alcoholism.

Today he is considered as one of the most influential composers of his time. In 2016, on the occasion of his 150th

birthday, the Israeli pianist Tamar Halperin interpreted his new works, asking how his works would sound if Satie would compose them today.



The Rotary Club of Honfleur is a very young club, chartered in 2007. The Club has today 25 members, and belongs to the District 1640. The members meet every Thursday at 7.30 pm at the Hotel Mercure, 4, rue des Vases, 14600 Honfleur.

This year's President is Gerard Poncet.



Honfleur is a historical and touristic center of about 7500 inhabitants on the south side of the mouth of the river Seine in the North Sea. Le Havre is at the other side of the Seine. Honfleur has a wonderful harbor with old 6 store high houses mainly dating from the 17th century. At the end of the 19th century Honfleur was very popular with painters and writers.



Honfleur-born Eugène Boudin painted many pictures of the lively Plage Le Butin. But also painters like Monet and Pissarro stayed there for a longer time and

Charles Baudelaire wrote here some poems and novels. Today Honfleur is still a very popular place for tourists, above all in the summer.

Today, as I write these words, there is an impressive manifestation of the Rotary Club of Honfleur at the Plage Le Butin. At 2pm there will be a reunion of the members of all 64 clubs of the District 1640 on the occasion of "Rotary Foundation International 100 years 1917-2017" to form the human word "Rotary Foundation". About 800 people of all the clubs of the District of Normandy are expected. In this district the clubs are working together very intensively and have many common projects.


