Celebration of Werner Loval's 90th Birthday

"Rotarians and Friends Remember 1976, the Year of Werner's Presidency"



Born in Bamburg, Germany on 27 April 1926 as Werner M. Löbl. He was separated from his parents in 1939 when the Kindertransport sent him to England with his sister; not to be reunited with his parents until three years later in Ecuador. Werner has had an intriguing life journey, which saw Werner working in a wide range of positions: in a pharmaceutical lab, a metal works company, as a stringer for a newspaper, an assistant to the manager of a textile company, a conscripted US soldier, a diplomat with postings in New York, Washington, Guatemala, Mexico, and the Dominican Republic and as real estate entrepreneur. Along the way he made aliya in 1954, found his lovely wife, Pamela Sabel, in 1956, and became a member of the Jerusalem Rotary Club in 1969, serving as president during the Rotary Year of 1976-77.

In celebration of his recent 90th birthday, Werner will reminisce over his presidency year, recalling the Rotary events of the year, including the speakers and activities, but also some of

the historical events occurring during the same year and their impact on the club.

International Toast

The Rotary Club of Jihlava, Czech Republic

The 18th of May, is the anniversary date of the day composer Gustav Mahler passed

away. He was born on 7 July 1860, in Kaliště in Bohemia, Then part of the Austrian Empire. In the same year the family moved to Iglau, now Jihlava in the Czech Republic. Here Gustav grew up in a Jewish family and acquired his first inspiration from which

he would compose music. Mahler studied in Vienna and in 1897 became the director of the Vienna Court Opera. To secure this post he was pressured to convert to Catholicism by the rising tide of anti-Semitism in Vienna. 1907 he left Vienna for New York, visiting many capitals. He retuned to Europe ill in 1911 and passed away on 18 May. In Vienna, at fifty years of age.

Mahler composed ten very complicated symphonies which were banned during the Nazi period, but which enjoyed a rediscovery after 1945 and they have become some of the most frequently performed and recorded works of the last 60 years. Quite interestingly, apropos this date, Mahler's widow, Alma, later married the young architect Walter Gropius, who incidentally was born on the 18th of May.

There is no Rotary Club in Kaliště, but there is a club in Iglau, today Jihlava, a part of the District 2240, founded in 1993. The club has 24 members and meets Thursdays at 7 pm at the Restaurant Nika/Atrium.

Girona's Jewish Connection

Last week we toasted the Rotary Club of Girona, but missed on the city's rich Jewish history.

The most prominent figure in Jewish Girona was the rabbi **Moses ben Nahman**, also known as **Nahmanides** or **Ramban**. This **philosopher**, **exe-**

gete, poet and doctor was born in the city in around 1194. He was a wise, pious man who left his mark on the history of Girona and all of Catalonia.



In **1263** he took part in the controversy known as the **Disputation of Barcelona** in which he dialectically came up against the convert Pau Cristià to publicly defend – at the request of the King – the Jewish religion. Shortly afterwards he set off for the Holy Land; **he died at San Juan de Acre** in Israel around **1270**.

As in the rest of Spain, the Jewish history of Girona ended in 1492 with the forced conversion and expulsion of the Jews.
