R/ Art Braunstein, USFSO (ret.):

"Fighting Antisemitism"

Art Braunstein has been the Club's Program Chair for the past seven years. He has extensive experience in interfaith activities. As such, he is a Board Member of the Israel Interfaith Association.

He did his first Masters in Paris, France, an erstwhile Catholic country. As a U.S. Foreign Service Officer, he was posted, over a 30-year career period, mostly to Arab and Moslem countries, but also to the Latin American Catholic sphere.



Art was senior English editor for all texts in Yad Vashem's Holocaust History Museum that opened in 2005 and has guided VIP visitors there. Six years ago he founded the non-sectarian Jewish Covenant Alliance, R.A. (JCA) to foster the educational struggle against Antisemitism and Regime Evil worldwide.

The focus of his talk will be on specific approaches and tools for Jews and non-Jews alike to combat Antisemitism based on extensive personal experience and action. To Be or Not to Be?

Should we Establish an Amuta?

Perhaps it is lucky for the club that the amuta was not formed. An amuta is a legal entity that is required to submit legal accounting and a professional report every year. That is quite costly.

Also, most likely the amuta will be checked once every few years by the tax authorities (as is routine in Israel) and at that time the fee for a CPA and other preparations can be high.

We are Rotary. Our funds are limited. Out activity is financially limited. We are a volunteer organisation. Our bank accounts are considered "vaad kita".

Do we really need to be an amuta? Do we want to take the risk of spending a chunk of our limited budget on formal costly legalities?

The Board has decided to establish the Amuta as a result of the disagreement to use the existing registered foundation for this matter.

I am afraid that your bewildering description does not represent reality. There are over 30,000 Amutot registered in Israel and other than an annual report, there is no hassle in management of most of them.

You do not have to look very far- has there ever been any problem in running our own Foundation, which is established as an Amuta?

And finally, we had substantial difficulties in the past year in managing our finances. Such an account as you mentioned was not allowed to receive our 400,000 Shekel grant money, which had to be returned to the US.

The world has changed and we have to realize it or be unable to function. Rotary and our club have a purpose, beyond a weekly lunch meeting. Dan S.

I personally sit on the board of many amutot so permit me to give my humble opinion.

Unless it is absolutely critical that you open an amuta I would strongly recommend against it.

The amount of bureaucracy and red tape involved today has become absurd due the the fact that many organizations abused the rights given to amutot in the past and the government has cracked down with compliance requirements.

The active participation of a qualified accountant and lawyer have become mandatory.

If there is no other way for Rotary to function other than becoming a registered Amuta, so be it, but I would strongly recommend that this option be avoided if at all possi-

Rotary President-elect Sam F. **Owori Dies**

Rotary International President-elect Sam F. Owori died unexpectedly on 13 July due to complications from surgery. Sam was a member of the Rotary Club Kampala, Uganda, for 38 years.

"Rotary has become a way of life for me with the intrinsic value and core belief in mutual responsibility and concern for one another as a cornerstone," Sam said when

he was nominated last year. "I feel immense satisfaction knowing that through Rotary, I've helped someone live better.

Sam's term as Rotary's 108th president would have begun on 1 July 2018.

"Please remember Sam as the outstanding, hardworking Rotarian he was," said Rotary International President Ian Riseley. "In this difficult time, I ask you

to keep his wife, Norah, the Owori family, and Sam's millions of friends around the world in your thoughts."

Under Sam's leadership, the number of clubs in Uganda swelled from nine to 89 over the course of 29 years.

Sam saw in Rotary members "an incredible passion to make a difference," and wanted to "harness that enthusiasm and pride so that every project becomes the engine of peace and prosperity."

Sam was the chief executive officer of the Institute of Corporate Governance of Uganda, whose mission is to promote excellence in corporate governance principles

and practice in the region by 2020. Previously, he was executive director of the African Development Bank, managing director of Uganda Commercial Bank Ltd., and director of Uganda Development Bank. He has also served as corporate secretary of the Central Bank of Uganda.


He served as member and chair of several boards including FAULU (U) Ltd., (now Opportunity Bank), the Uganda Heart Institute, the Centre for African Family Studies, Mulago

Hospital Complex, Mukono Theological College, and the Kampala City Council.

Sam also was the vice chair of Hospice Af-

rica Uganda, and board member and chair of the Audit Committee of PACE (Programme for Accessible Health, Communication, and Education) in Uganda.
