Amira Oron, Director, Egypt Department, Israel Ministry of Foreign Affairs:

"Egypt Facing the Current Middle East Struggles"



Amira Oron was born in Israel in 1966. She lives in Jerusalem and is the mother of two boys.

Ms Oron earned her BA in Middle East Studies, Arabic language and literature and an MA in Middle East Studies from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem.

Amira joined the Israel Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1991 and has held a number of posts, including that of vice-consul for academic and cultural affairs in Chicago,

Economic Attaché in Cairo, spokesperson of the Israeli delegation to the European Union in Brussels, and the Ministry's spokesperson in the Arabic language.

Since 2008 she has been Head of the Egypt Department at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Egypt, the Arab world's most populous country is also one of its most authoritarian. Between economic challenges and an uncertain political succession for President Hosni Mubarak, Egypt is struggling to maintain its role as an Arab leader while performing a high-wire act between

the United States, regional players such as Saudi Arabia and Turkey, as well as its old foe-cum-ally of sorts, Israel.



A Day that Shook the World

On 1 October 331 BC, Alexander the Great defeated Darius III of Persia in the Battle of Gaugamela, and history was changed forever. Without Gaugamela there would be no spread of Hellenistic culture, no Christianity, perhaps no Islamic State...

The fierce battle ended with Darius escaping east, only to be murdered by his own men.

Alexander gave Darius a full burial ceremony at Persepolis. The Persian Empire

ended with the death of Darius.


