This Week's Programme

Prof. Moshe Arens

Former Minister of Defense



"The Lavi Fighter Project, Past, Present, and Future"

Prof. Moshe (Misha) Arens was born in 1925 in Lithuania, immigrated to the United Sates in 1939. He earned his BS engineering degree from MIT and a degree in aeronautical engineering from Caltech. He served in both the U.S Army Corp of Engineers and the Etzel during the War of Independence. In 1951, Prof. Arens returned to the US to study aeronautical engineering at Caltech.

At 90 years of age, he has served many positions, in and out of government, including positions in academia and industry.

Prof. Arens 25 years of service in the Knesset began in 1974. during which

time he served as

Chairman of the Knesset Foreign Affairs and Defense Committee. 1982
Prof. Arens was appointed Ambassador to Washington. He was required to leave that post in 1983 to become the Minister of Defense a role he would take on once more in 1990. He also

served as Minister without Portfolio, 1983-84 and 1988, and Foreign Minister from 1990-1992. Prof. Arens championed the



development of the hitech Lavi jet fighter. In spite of successful flights, the program a was ultimately cancelled in 1987.



Celebrating 100 Years

At the 1917 convention, outgoing RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed to set up an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.



GROWTH OF THE FOUNDATION

In 1929, the Foundation made its first gift of



\$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organization, created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen, later grew into Easter Seals.

When Rotary founder Paul Harris died in 1947, contributions began pouring in to Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the Foundation.

EVOLUTION OF THE FOUNDATION

1947: The Foundation established its first program, Fellowships for Advance Study, later

known as Ambassadorial Scholarships.

1965-66: Three programs were launched: Group Study Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, and



Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Ob-

jective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants.

1978: Rotary in-



troduced the Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants. The first 3-H Grant funded a project to immunize 6 million Philippine children against polio.

1985: The PolioPlus program was launched to

eradicate polio worldwide.



1987-88: The first peace forums were held, leading to Rotary Peace Fellowships.

2013: New district, global, and packaged grants enable Rotarians

around the world to respond to the world's greatest needs.

Since the first donation of \$26.50 in 1917, the Foundation has received contributions totaling more than \$1 billion.

"Bye, bye, Miss American Pie..."

In the United States, 3 February is often referred to as "The Day the Music Died", a phrase immortalized by singer Don McLean in his song "American Pie" where he refers to the tragic airplane crash which took the lives of three of the most promising young musicians and song writers of the day: The Big Bopper, Buddy Holly, and Richie Valens.



Many conflicting theories have been suggested over the years about how a four passenger Beechcraft Bonanza flying with an experienced, but young, 21 yr. old, pilot flying in dangerous wintry conditions might have come to crash in a cornfield minutes after takeoff. What is not contested is the tremendous loss the crash presented to the world of music . The Big Bopper (J.P. Richards) had the year before released the well received favorite "Chantilly Lace", Richie Valens had just released the immensely popular "La Bamba" and Buddy Holly's contribution to music was to fundamentally change the music of the day and influence



countless artists who would follow.

Buddy, who was fed up with the cold of the touring

bus, decided to contract an airplane to fly three of the members (the capacity of the airplane) to Fargo, North Dakota, the closest airport to their next concert at Morehead, Minne-

sota. The airplane left the airport at Mason City, the closest airport to their last concert in Clear Lake, Iowa, at about 1:00 am in the morning in the midst of stormy wintry conditions but crashed a few minutes later.

We commemorate this memorable date by toasting the Rotary Club of Mason City, Iowa, (Mason City Noon Rotary) where on 18 June 2016 the Mason City Noon Rotary Club will celebrate their centennial anniversary.
